**WHY ARE YOU DRIVING A MOTORCYCLE WITHOUT A HELMET ON YOUR HEAD? BECAUSE I BROKE MY HELMET WHEN I FELL THE OTHER DAY.**
- ☛ How tall is Karen? She said she's five feet six inches tall.  
**QUE ALTURA TEM KAREN? ELA DISSE QUE TEM CINCO PÉS E SEIS POLEGADAS DE ALTURA.**
- ☛ Quantas jardas uma formiga caminha durante um dia? Eu não sei. Eu não sei nada sobre formigas.  
**HOW MANY YARDS DOES AN ANT WALK DURING A DAY? I DON'T KNOW. I DON'T KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT ANTS.**
- ☛ Can I help you? Yes, I need some information on height, weight, length and width of this.  
**POSSO AJUDÁ-LO? SIM, PRECISO DE (ALGUMA) INFORMAÇÃO DA (SOBRE) ALTURA, PESO, COMPRIMENTO E LARGURA DISTO.**
- ☛ Quantas milhas as escoteiras caminharam no domingo? Elas ficaram em casa porque estavam com medo da tempestade.  
**HOW MANY MILES DID THE GIRL SCOUTS WALK ON SUNDAY? THEY STAYED (AT) HOME BECAUSE THEY WERE AFRAID OF THE STORM.**
- ☛ Why do you want such a fancy marble floor? I want the best for you.  
**POR QUE VOCÊ QUER UM PISO DE MÁRMORE TÃO LUXUOSO? EU QUERO O MELHOR PARA VOCÊ.**
- ☛ Que distância você geralmente tem que dirigir para a escola? Não longe, somente em torno de duas milhas.  
**WHAT DISTANCE DO YOU USUALLY HAVE TO DRIVE TO SCHOOL? NOT FAR, ONLY ABOUT TWO MILES.**
- ☛ Why are there so many flies in the kitchen? Because Bobby spilled sugar all over the floor.  
**POR QUE HÁ TANTAS MOSCAS NA COZINHA? PORQUE BOBBY DERRAMOU AÇÚCAR POR TODO O CHÃO.**
- ☛ Como você sabe que as crianças não estão aqui? Por causa deste silêncio maravilhoso.  
**HOW DO YOU KNOW THAT THE CHILDREN AREN'T HERE? BECAUSE OF THIS WONDERFUL SILENCE.**
- ☛ They solved my problem. And did they charge anything for their work?  
**ELES RESOLVERAM MEU PROBLEMA. E ELAS COBRARAM ALGUMA COISA PELO TRABALHO DELES?**

- He isn't wearing tennis shoes today.  
**AND HE'D LOST THE MATCH BECAUSE OF IT.**
- I don't know the distance from here to my office.  
**BUT YOU GO TO WORK EVERY DAY!**
- It seems the boys scouts are busy.  
**THEY HAVE A VERY DEMANDING COACH.**
- Look at the elephant trunk!  
**I'VE NEVER SEEN SUCH A BIG ELEPHANT!**
- Guess what color he painted his gate!  
**I THINK HE HAS PAINTED GREEN. IS THAT RIGHT?**
- He said he wouldn't charge very much for the job.  
**AS USUAL HE WAS LYING, HE CHARGED US A LOT OF MONEY.**
- They are the ones who did that!  
**I CANNOT BELIEVE!**
- I know why our dog is scratching himself so much.  
**DID YOU TAKE HIM TO THE VETERINARY?**

- (a bit / slowly )  
You are driving so fast. Can you drive **A BIT MORE SLOWLY?**
- (a lot / easy)  
It's **A LOT EASIER** to learn a language in a country where it is spoken.
- (slightly / old)  
I thought she was younger than me, but in fact she is **SLIGHTLY OLDER.**

## COMPLETE THE SENTENCES USING ANY OR NO + COMPARATIVE. USE THAN WHEN NECESSARY. FOLLOW THE EXAMPLE:

- I have waited long enough. I am not waiting **ANY LONGER.**
- I am sorry I am a bit late, but I couldn't get here **ANY SOONER / ANY EARLIER.**
- This shop isn't expensive. The prices are **NO HIGHER THAN / NO MORE EXPENSIVE THAN / NO WORSE THAN** anywhere else.
- I need to stop for a rest. I can't walk **ANY FURTHER.**

- (difficult)  
It's getting **MORE AND MORE DIFFICULT** to get a job.
- (big)  
That hole in your sweater is getting **BIGGER AND BIGGER.**
- (heavy)  
My bags seemed to get **HEAVIER AND HEAVIER** as I carried them.
- (nervous)  
As I waited for my interview, I became **MORE AND MORE NERVOUS.**
- (bad)  
As the day went on, the weather got **WORSE AND WORSE.**
- (expensive)  
Health care is becoming **MORE AND MORE EXPENSIVE.**
- (good)  
Since Anna went to Canada, her English has got **BETTER AND BETTER.**
- (talkative)  
As the conversation went on, Paul became **MORE AND MORE TALKATIVE.**

## COMPLETE THE SENTENCES USING THE ... THE ...:

- (feel)  
I like warm weather.  
The warmer the weather, **THE BETTER I FEEL.**
- (like)  
I didn't really like him when we first met.  
But the more I got to know him, **THE MORE I LIKED HIM / THE MORE I GOT TO LIKE HIM.**
- (profit)  
If you are in business, you want to make a profit.  
The more goods you sell, **THE MORE PROFIT YOU WILL MAKE / THE HIGHER YOUR PROFIT WILL BE / THE BIGGER YOU PROFIT WILL BE.**
- (hard)  
It's hard to concentrate when you are tired.  
The more tired you are, **THE HARDER IT IS TO CONCENTRATE.**
- (impatient / become)  
Kate had to wait a very long time.  
The longer she had to wait, **THE MORE IMPATIENT SHE BECAME.**
